American Law and Government

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This course is a study of the origins, development, structure, and functions of American national government. Topics include the constitutional framework; federalism; the three branches of government, including the bureaucracy; civil rights and liberties; political participation and behavior; and policy formation. Upon completion, students should be able to demonstrate an understanding of the basic concepts and participatory processes of the American political system. Basic concepts of state and local government and their relationships with the federal government are also examined. Students are expected to be prepared and participate *daily*.

Grades will be based off assignments, tests, and participation. Grades will be assigned by percentage of points earned out of those possible.

Earning Points

- Students can expect to have homework each class. These assignments must be completed by the beginning of the next class session for full credit. Turning in assignments on time will have the greatest impact on a grade.
- Many assignments, along with some tests, will be passed to another student in the class to grade. The rest will be graded by the teacher. I will also grade written assignments and exams.

Assignments

- I will try to give students as much time as possible for work in class. However, as a high school level course, daily homework should be expected.
- Larger projects may require more outside
 work
- If a student is absent, it is *their* responsibility to get any missed work and make arrangements to fulfill requirements.
- For excused absences, students have one week from the day they return to class to turn in assignments. To view what students missed look on the class website or the log in the classroom.
- Assignments from unexcused absences may not be made up.
- Students are expected to do the required reading and assignments prior to class in order to contribute to class discussions.

Extra Credit

 Extra credit assignments will be given upon student request. Students may not have any missing work to receive extra credit. Extra credit assignments will be added to grades at the end of the term if there are no other missing assignments.

Turning in Assignments

- Assignments are due at the beginning of class unless otherwise specified.
- *If students turn in their work on time, they will be able to re-do the assignment for additional credit up until the unit test.
- Late work is accepted with a 10% deduction per class period it is late, up to 50%. Assignments turned in late will not have the option to re-do for additional credit.
- Late assignments will not be accepted after the unit test.
- Assignments turned in early are welcome!
- Assignments will be returned when graded.
- Re-done assignments must be turned in *with* the original assignment.
