

How did electricity change the way people lived in Utah in the early 1900s?


- Electric trains made it easier to travel between towns.

- protected our forests, parks, and monuments






How did World War I change life for Utahns in the early 1900s?

- World War I changed Utah's focus on local issues to worldwide issues.
- Utahns helped in the war effort by developing the first automatic machine gun, copper for guns and ammunition, wheat to feed the troops, and soldiers to fight.




How did life change for Utahns after the war?




- After the war, the United States entered into a time of prosperity now referred to as the Roaring Twenties.
- The Roaring Twenties was followed by the Great Depression.

How did the Great Depression change life for Utahns?



- Few people had jobs.
- Because people didn't have jobs, they couldn't buy things.
- Because people couldn't buy things, businesses lost sales and had to lay off workers.

How did Roosevelt's New Deal help Utahns?



- To help people get back to work,
 President Roosevelt created agencies that provided jobs.
- The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) hired men to build dams, bridges, and campgrounds in Utah.
- The Works Progress Administration (WPA) hired men to build highways, roads, and other public places.

How did Roosevelt's New Deal help Utahns?



- The Farm Security Administration (FSA) funded camps for migrant workers and gave farmers low interest loans.
- The Federal Emergency Relief Administration (FERA) helped states in time of need. During a drought in Utah, they provided money to build dams and irrigation ditches.
